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PROFILE OF UEW

The University of Education, Winneba (UEW) was established in September, 1992 as a University College under PNDC Law 322. On 14th May, 2004, the University of Education Act, (2004) Act 672 was enacted to upgrade the status of the University College of Education of Winneba to the status of a full University.

The University College of Education of Winneba brought together seven diploma awarding colleges located in different towns under one umbrella institution. These Colleges were the Advanced Teacher Training College, the Specialist Training College and the National

Academy of Music, all at Winneba; the School of Ghana Languages, Ajumako; the College of Special Education, Akwapim- Mampong; the Advanced Technical Training College, Kumasi; and the St. Andrews Agricultural Training College, Asante-Mampong.

By enactment of the Akenten Appiah-Menka University of Skills Training and Entrepreneurial Development Act (2020) Act 1026, the Kumasi and Asante-Mampong Campuses have ceased to be satellite campuses of UEW.

WINNEBA: THE HOST TOWN

Winneba is a town and the capital of Effutu Municipal Assembly (EMA) in Central Region of Southern Ghana. Winneba has a population of about 55,331.

Winneba, traditionally known as Simpa, is a historic fishing port in southern Ghana, lying on the south coast, 140 kilometres (90 miles) east of Cape Coast. The EMA also falls under the Effutu Constituency.

HISTORY

From pre-colonial times through the establishment of the British colony the Gold Coast, Winneba (Effutu) served as a port town.

The people of Winneba (Efutu) were led by their fearless spiritual leader and warrior, Kwamena Gyarteh

Ayirebi-Gyan with the support of a large youthful militia called the Asafo Groups made up of both men and women. He ensured that his people were well protected from external attacks by other migrating families, clans, diseases or hunger.

INDUSTRY AND CULTURE

The main industries of Winneba are fishing and services. It is known for the Aboakyer (deer-hunting festival) and its New Year fancy dress carnival/masquerading festival. The town has a rich musical tradition and currently boasts of several renowned musical groups in the country, including the Winneba Youth Choir, the Osimpam Ompeh group, and the Akoo Show Choir. Winneba Senior High School



is the major public secondary cycle educational institute available in this town.

The University of Education, Winneba has three main site in Winneba (South Campus, Central Campus, North Campus).

FESTIVALS

Fancy Dress Festival

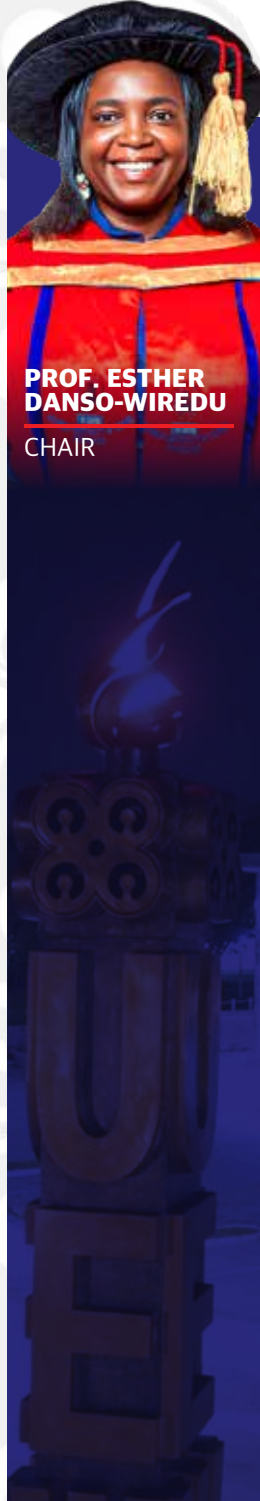
Masquerade festival, popularly known as fancy dress, is held every new year by the people of Winneba. It attracts a large number of tourists around the world. It is the second most popular festival in Winneba. The groups that compete for honours consists of Nobles as number one, Egya as number two, Atumu as number three, Red Cross as number four and Royals as number 5.

Aboakyer festival

Aboakyer festival is a bushbuck hunting festival celebrated by the people of Winneba in the Central Region of Ghana. The name Aboakyer translates as ‘hunting for game or animal’ in Fante dialect as spoken by the people of the Central region. The institution of the festival was to commemorate the migration of the Simpafo (the aboriginal name of the people of Winneba).

The Aboakyer Festival is being celebrated by the people of Effutu, who were among the earliest settlers of Ghana, for uncountable number of years. It sprang up when the Effutu people departed from Western Sudan and journeyed to the present town of Winneba in the Central Region of Ghana. They came with their god, known as Penkye Otu.

PROFILE

Prof. **PLO Lumumba** is a Professor of Public Law, a holder of an LL.D (Doctor of Laws) on the Law of the Sea from the University of Ghent, Belgium, Master of Laws degree and Bachelor of Laws degree from the University of Nairobi. Prof PLO Lumumba holds an honorary Degree of Doctor of Letters (D.Litt.) (Honoris Causa) from the University of Cape Coast in Ghana. He is also a holder of the Degree of Doctor of Science (DSc) (Honoris Causa) from Bells University of Technology in Nigeria. He has been trained on Humans Rights at the Institute of Advanced Legal Studies University of London in England, Humanitarian Law at the Raoul Wallenberg Institute of the University of Lund in Sweden and on International Humanitarian Law in Geneva, Switzerland. He is an Advocate of the High Courts of Kenya and Tanganyika and a Certified Mediator. He is a Fellow of the Institute of Certified Public Secretaries of Kenya FCPS (K), a Fellow of the Kenya Institute of Management (FKIM) and Honorary Fellow of the African Academy of Sciences (FAAS). He is the Chairman of Farafina Investment Group in Monrovia, Liberia and Economic Strategic Growth and Development Initiative for Africa based in Nigeria.

He is the immediate former Director and Chief Executive Officer of the Kenya School of Law, a former Secretary of the Constitution of Kenya Review Commission and a former Director of the Kenya Anti-Corruption Commission (KACC). He is the Founding Trustee of the African Institute for Leaders and Leadership (AILL) and founding Chairman of the Association of the Citizens Against Corruption (ACAC). He was the Founding Dean, Kabarak University School of Law, a former lecturer at the University of Nairobi (UON), the United States International University (USIU Africa), Widener University USA (Nairobi Summer School) and Chancellor of the Unity University in Hargeisa.

He is a renowned legal practitioner. He has written several books including: Criminal Procedure in Kenya, An outline of Judicial Review in Kenya, Kenya's long search for a Constitution: The Postponed Promise and Judicial Review and Administrative Law. He has published numerous articles in refereed journals and several book chapters. He has also edited several Books including Devolution in Kenya (with Prof. Mbondenyi and Dr. Kabau), The Constitution of Kenya (Contemporary Readings) (with Prof. M.K. Mbondenyi and S.O. Odero). He has co-authored 'The Constitution of Kenya 2010 An introductory commentary' with Dr. Luis Franceschi. He has also co-authored several books on Ethics. His non-legal books include; Swearing by Kenya, A Call for Page 1 of 3 Political Hygiene in Kenya, The Searching Soul, Sanitizing Kenyan Politics, Mhh Africa! (Kiswahili), Ang'o Marach (Dholuo) and Watim Ang'o (Dholuo). He has also co-authored thirteen (13) other Books on Integrity as School Series. He has recently ventured into fiction with his book 'STOLEN MOMENTS' and translated the Kiswahili play Kigogo into English as The Leader.

PROFILE _____

Dr. **Samuel Koranteng-Pipim (PhD)** is a US-based Ghanaian author, inspirational speaker, leadership trainer, and advocate for youth empowerment. He was trained in engineering and systematic theology, and has authored 26 books, including bestselling works on inspiration and Africa's renewal & transformation.

Dr. Pipim currently directs the EAGLES and ANANSE Centers for Leadership Development, where he promotes excellence and "mind liberation" to drive transformational change.

(EAGLES = Empowerment & Advisory Group for Leadership, Excellence & Service;

ANANSE = African Network & Advisory for Needed Services & Excellence)

He speaks extensively around the world at events for youth, students, professionals, and civic & religious leaders. Dr. Pipim delivered the keynote message at the 2018 African Heads of State Summit Prayer Breakfast at the African Union Headquarters in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia. The summit was themed: "Winning the Fight Against Corruption: A Sustainable Path to Africa's Transformation."

For 12 years, Dr. Pipim served as a Director of Public Campus Ministries, ministering to students, faculty, and staff at The University of Michigan, USA. In that role he grandfathered and mentored many grassroots youth and young professional movements around the world.

As a visiting lecturer and adjunct professor, he has taught courses in theology, ethics, & transformational leadership in several universities in Africa, Asia, Australia, Europe, North & South America, Russia &

Ukraine. He has also conducted Bible Lectures for students in leading universities like Harvard, MIT, Manchester, Stanford, and Wellesley. His public Bible lectures on a wide variety of subjects are presented in a winsome and dynamic way that engages both the hearts and minds of his audiences, whether secular or religious.

Believing in the ideals of Pan Africanism and the African Renaissance as enshrined in the AU's Agenda 2063 Document, and believing that university communities play an indispensable role in creating "the Africa We Want," Dr. Pipim has felt compelled to traverse the continent to present his life-transforming messages in some 30+ African universities.

Dr. Pipim is a lifelong student in the school of adversities, hardship and pain, and seeks to encourage students who are similarly enrolled in this school. Hence, in addition to his multi-pronged and multi-disciplinary engagements, Dr. Pipim also serves as a personal growth & executive coach through his "Sankofa Coaching" platform. He focuses on: (i) busy executives and leaders who are struggling privately with real life issues; and (ii) young adults and young professionals who are navigating challenges and personal failures.

For more than a decade, Dr. Pipim has also been engaged in resolving disputes as a mediator.

While transitioning to Ghana, Dr. Pipim served as Corporate Executive in Residence at the University of Ghana Business School's Innovation & Incubation Hub. He also serves as Executive President of the African Foundation for Excellence & Service, where he oversees youth leadership development, entrepreneurship, transformational education, and diaspora relations.

Dr. Pipim's three decades of experience in transformational leadership development, campus chaplaincy and spiritual care, and inspirational lectures and publications have impacted thousands of young people around the world. He has mentored countless students and young professionals, and has served as consultant, trainer, and/or advisor to

various youth organizations and institutions. They include:

LEADERSHIP/PHILOSOPHICAL CONVICTIONS

Dr. Pipim’s emphasis that “Africa’s most urgent want is the want of transformational leaders” drives his passion to train and mentor the

youth to be Africa's leaders. His well-known philosophical convictions in leadership development include the following:

- (i) "Leadership is not about you, but begins with you. Great leaders train people to SUCCEED them; but transformational leaders train people to SUPERSEDE them. Africa must train, mentor, and empower the youth to be transformational leaders."
- (ii) "The hallmark of a true African is (or ought to be) the ability to THINK. And if thinking is the measure, then there are very few true Africans—whether they're on the continent or in the Diaspora."
- (iii) "There's nothing wrong with the African mind. Our problem is the African MINDSET. Ours is not a lack of resources, but a deficit of resourcefulness."
- (iv) "The heart of the African problem is the African heart. This heart (or mindset) must be transformed—from within."
- (v) "Gold without the Golden Rule is poverty and misery. Without values or ethics, our resources are a curse."
- (vi) "Because mediocrity is now the standard, the excellence that should be normal has become the exception. What IS has now replaced what OUGHT to be."
- (vii) "Be an EAGLE, not a chicken. Pursue excellence, not mediocrity. Excellence is distinction. Mediocrity is extinction. Choose to be DISTINCT, not EXTINCT."
- (viii) "Success is not sexually-transmitted; it's not between the legs, but between the ears. Africa must THINK."
- (ix) "Those who read are those who lead, but those who write keep the leaders right. Africa must READ and Africa must WRITE."
- (x) "Mindless religion is one of Africa's greatest woes. WE

DON'T THINK. Our religion is 100 kilometers wide and only 1-millimeter deep.”

- (xi) “Christianity and churches are not the answer. Christians are not the answer. Christ is! Africa must model Christ’s life of humility, excellence, & service.”
- (xii) “Africa, you can rise again. For, after failure empties your cup, God’s grace can fill it to the brim again. Stand up, stand out, and stand tall.”

Based on the above leadership/philosophical convictions, Dr. Pipim stresses that Africa’s renewal & survival requires ethical values, visionary thinking, selfless & sacrificial service, and a reliance on Christ as the ultimate solution.

With a call for Africans to “think, rise, and lead,” Dr. Pipim emphasizes that: (i) NOW is Africa’s moment to achieve transformational change; (ii) Transformed youth should be the ones to drive the change; (iii) True education should move beyond the “cult of the certificate” to developing minds that can THINK and DO, excellently and with integrity.

Dr. Pipim’s hobbies include: Reading, writing, teaching, and grassroots advocacy for youth. He also enjoys good quality African music and food. (Emphasis on “good quality African.”)

PROFILE

Mr. **Edmond Moukala** is a Congolese sinologist who holds a Master's Degree in Law, a Bachelor's Degree in Design and planning, and a Civil Engineering Degree. He is an expert on sustainable development that is in harmony with local traditional values and knowledge.

Mr. Moukala has been working for UNESCO for more than 30 years. His contributions to the development agenda span a wide array of issues and projects most typically the Silk Road Projects now called the "Belt and Road Initiative" in China, Mongolia, both North and South Korea, and Japan. From 2004 to 2010, he worked in the Intercultural Dialogue's Division where he initiated and organized the commemoration of the bicentenary of the abolition of the slave trade and slavery in the United Kingdom in 2007 and in the United States in 2008.

He developed with the Department of History of Harvard University, the first Atlas of Scientific and Cultural Interactions between Africa and the Americas by Afro-descendants. He also contributed to the implementation of UNESCO's action plan for the International Decade for the Rapprochement of Cultures and the promotion of dialogue among civilizations.

From 2014 to 2020, as Head of the Africa Unit of the World Heritage Center, he coordinated the implementation of the 1972 World Heritage Convention in 46 African countries. It is in this context that he initiated the African World Heritage Day which is celebrated on May 5.

He was the Head of the UNESCO Office in Bamako, Mali (2019 – 2023) and, in the interim, from October 2023 to October 2024.

Since October 15, 2023, he has been the new Head of the UNESCO Office in Accra and UNESCO's Representative to Ghana.

Mr. Moukala undertakes research in diplomatic relations between Africa and China, Africa and its development potential, and the comparative study of Chinese economic development and its added value for the development of Africa.

He is the editor and co-editor of several publications, including the one on heritage preservation and sustainable development.

Edmond is a firm believer of African descent, its rich culture, and its immense potential.

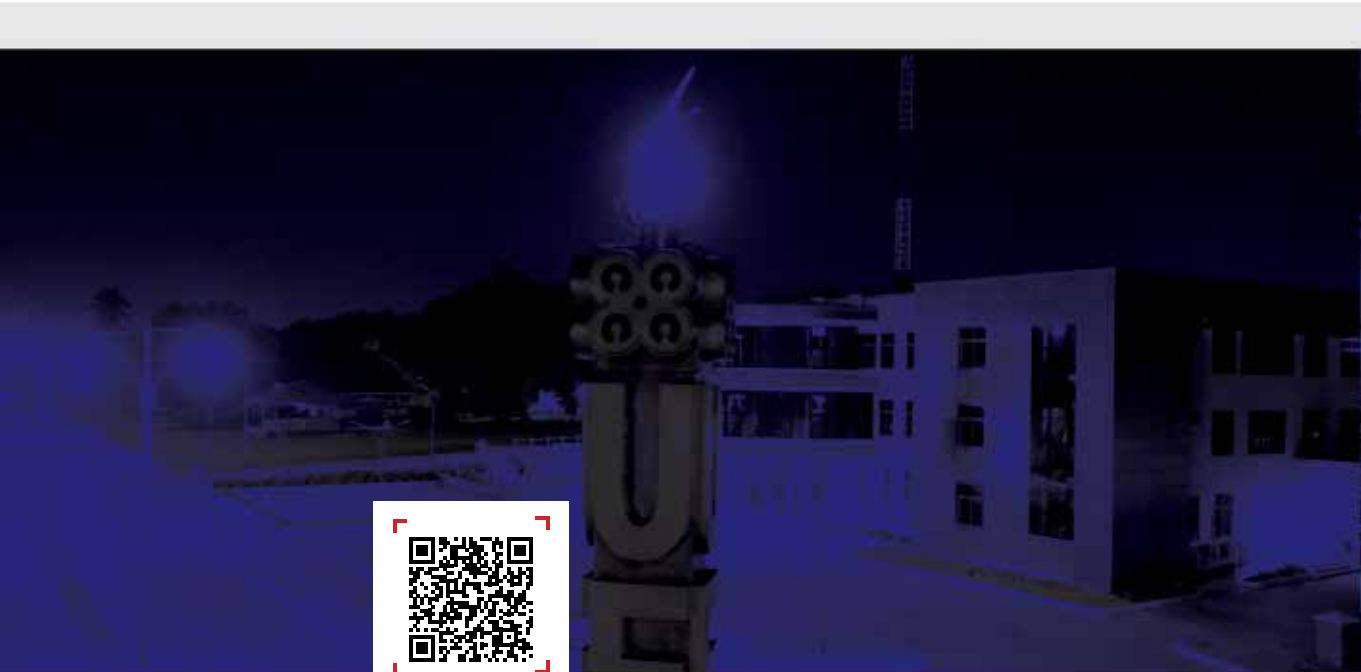
